



Gaps today


- Moratorium on hiring staff since 2007
- Uneven quality across the country
- Lack of 24 hour access
- Lack of psychological therapies
- Reducing beds and slow development of community services
- Staffing 75% of recommended in policy
- Legislation out of compliance with human rights
- Poor links with employment
- No information system for community services





General population

- Increased emigration, particularly young people and young families
- Increased number of suicides (552 in 2009) 12.7 deaths per 100K population
- Fourth highest rate of youth suicide in Europe
- Leading cause of death in men aged 15-24 years
- Year-on-year increased presentations of self-harm to A&E 2007-2010
- 3% Increase in calls to Samaritans with one in six financial-related





People with mental health difficulties

- Harder to get disability benefits
- Financial pressure from increased prescription charges, higher rent contributions, reduced fuel, tv and other household allowances
- Very difficult to access employment
- Very difficult to get a Government employment scheme place
- Difficulty finding rental accommodation
- Easier to talk about mental health because everyone is under stress



Opportunities

- New Director for Mental Health
- Government commitment
- Wider political interest
- Reconfigured staff resources with multidisciplinary staff
- National counselling service in primary care
- Increased public awareness
